### Research roundup

- Cultural barriers make it difficult for African-American parents to get information and services for their autistic children from white healthcare providers. *Journal of Racial and Ethnic Health Disparities*
- Mothers of adolescents with autism plus a second mental health condition experience stress, and struggle to find good care for their children, according to a small study. *Journal of Child and Family Studies*
- Children with autism and those with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder share many of the same rare mutations. *Nature Neuroscience*
- Fenfluramine, a discontinued appetite suppressant, may decrease the frequency of seizures in people with Dravet syndrome who don't respond to other medications. *JAMA Neurology*
- Practicing yoga may improve autistic children's motor and imitation skills. *Physical Therapy*
- Women with an altered FMR1 gene — a 'premutation' that does not result in fragile X syndrome — differ from controls in how they look at faces. *Physiology and Behavior*
- A mouse model of fragile X syndrome shows unusual firing patterns even at the level of single neurons. *eNeuro*
